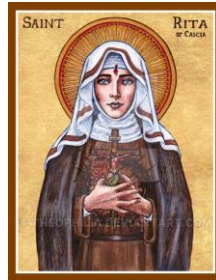

Saint of the week: Rita of Cascia circa 1381 – 1457. (*Feast May 22*). Born near Spoleto, Italy, Rita wanted to be



a nun but married in deference to her parents. For nearly 20 years, she endured her profligate husband's mistreatment. Following his violent death, she was admitted after three refusals to an Augustinian convent at Cascia, where she spent the next 40 years. She is remembered for her devoted care of sick nuns and for a deep forehead wound that lasted 15

years, caused she said by a thorn from Christ's crown of thorns. She has a large popular following and is invoked in Italy for difficult situations.

Respect Life News: In the April 22 bulletin we reported that pro-life legislation had been enacted in Nebraska and Mississippi. A federal court, however, has temporarily blocked the Mississippi law. More recently, still another state pro-life law, after "a long, contentious debate," was passed by the Iowa House of Representatives 51 to 46 and by the state Senate 29 to 17. On Friday May 4, the Governor, Kim Reynolds (R), who has described herself as "100-percent pro-life," signed the law which prohibits abortions after an unborn baby has a detectable heartbeat which is around six weeks of pregnancy. This "heartbeat legislation" as it is known, would require abortion practitioners to test for the unborn baby's heartbeat before performing an abortion. If a heartbeat is detected, the abortion would be prohibited except in cases involving medical emergency, rape, incest or fetal abnormalities deemed to be "incompatible" with life. Though less than perfect, this law provides the strongest protection for preborn children in the U.S. Two other states, North Dakota and Arkansas, passed heartbeat/first trimester preborn protection bills in previous years, but unfortunately those bills were blocked by the courts. The bill also would ban anyone from "acquiring, providing, receiving, transferring, or using a fetal body part in Iowa" As was to be expected, immediately after Governor Reynolds' announcement Friday, branches of Planned Parenthood and the American Civil Liberties Union in Iowa responded with plans to sue the state. The law, nevertheless, is the "strictest abortion regulation in the nation." Undoubtedly, the state will face a long "court fight," the successful outcome of which is not certain. "Because of the current make-up of the U.S. Supreme Court and lower courts, a law to prohibit abortions in the first trimester most likely would not survive a court challenge." Olivet Cemetery, (202-399-3000); Resurrection Cemetery (301-868-5141); St. Mary's Queen of Peace Cemetery, (301-475-5005)].
