**Saint of the week:** Veronica, 1<sup>st</sup> Century. (*Feast July 12*).

Veronica does not appear in the Roman Martyrology, the church's official list of feasts. According to legend, she was the woman who took pity on Jesus as he carried his cross, wiped his face with a cloth and was left with an image of the suffering Christ. Many such images, known as "veronicas" and "vernicles," existed in the



Middle Ages. Veronica was sometimes associated with other New Testament women, but there is no evidence that she was real. Her name may come from a combination of Latin ("vera" for true) and Greek ("eikon" for image) words. Her story was included in the Stations of the Cross in the 19th century.

**Respect Life News:** The National Right to Life Committee (NRLC) is celebrating its 50th anniversary this year. It is the first nationwide right to life organization. Not only is it the oldest such group in the country, it is also the largest. NRLC is the federation of 50 state right-to-life affiliates and more than 3,000 local chapters. Through education and legislation, it works to restore legal protection to the most defenseless members of our society who are threatened by abortion, infanticide, assisted suicide and euthanasia. In 1967, Father James T. McHugh (1932-2000) future bishop of Camden N.J. and Rockville Center, N.Y. was appointed by the National Conference of Catholic Bishops (renamed USCCB in 2001) to lead the early formation of what was to become the National Right to Life Committee in 1968. To appeal to a more broad-based, nonsectarian movement, key NRLC leaders proposed an organizational model that would separate the NRLC from the direct oversight of the NCCB. The Committee was founded to respond to efforts throughout the country to change state laws on abortion. The need for the group became even greater after the Supreme Court's 22 January 1973 decision in *Roe v Wade* and its companion decision *Doe v. Bolton*. The latter decision's very broad "health" definition as a consequence, became the standard permitting late term abortions after the point of viability (usually about 23-24 weeks) The group worked with the late pro-life champion, Representative Henry J. Hyde (1924-2007, R-ILL) to enact the Hyde Amendment which prevents the use of tax dollars from paying for abortion. In 1980 it formed the NRL Political Action Committee to elect pro-life men and women who would pass pro-life laws. It has created outreach programs to work with those in the religious community and women who had abortions, with African-Americans, Hispanics, and Native Americans. It also formed an outreach program geared specifically toward teens called National Teens for Life and on June 28-30, in Overland Park, Kansas, it held its 48th annual convention. Among its speakers were Archbishop Joseph F. Naumann of the Archdiocese of Kansas City who will begin a three years term as the chairman of the USCCB's Secretariat of Pro-life Activities in November 2018 and is the Co-Chair for the Religious Alliance Against Pornography.
